MESSAGE FROM THE EDITOR

I wish to let everyone know that this is the LAST issue that I will be able to prepare! My former co-editor, Linda Ivany, has already departed for the summer, and I will be leaving in August. So, in order to have a Septmeber issue, SOMEBODY <u>PLEASE</u> VOLUNTEER TO BE EDITOR!

I must say, in retrospect, that I have enjoyed my short tenure as newsletter editor. It is sometimes fun, sometimes frustrating, but always challenging to organize something like this. I feel good that I have contributed something to an organization that has done so much for me in the past several years.

Sorry this issue is so short and a little late in coming to you. Sometimes it is out of an editor's hands when people do not get their parts of the newsletter to the editor in time!

MUSEUM HAPPENINGS

We first wish to welcome Drs. Dilcher and Manchester to the museum faculty. Their research interests are in paleobotany, and they have moved their incredible collection with them from Indiana. The addition of a paleobotany collection and research program will greatly enhance the museum's paleontology program.

VERTEBRATE PALEONTOLOGY

The summer is going well for all of us. The entire VP collection is currently in limbo as we are installing compactors to store our growing collection. The installation process will continue at least through July, and the collection is essentially inaccessible until that time. BRUCE MACFADDEN has returned from sabbatical at Cornell University in Ithaca, New York, and attended a conference in France in May. He has completed a manuscript with DAN BRYANT and PAUL MUELLER (UF Geology Dept.) on calibration of horse evolution in Florida, which has been submitted to Geology. Bruce is also hard at work completing a book on fossil horses that will be published by Oxford University Press. DAVE WEBB, ALCEU RANCY, and JOHN EISENBERG (FMNH) are currently in Brazil for the South American mammal meetings. GARY MORGAN, RICHARD HULBERT, and ART POYER are keeping very busy with installation of the compactors. DAN BRYANT has completed his master's thesis and will officially graduate in August; he has kept busy, submitting three manuscripts so far this summer, and

has begun work on a fourth. In addition to the lab work, BRUCE MACFADDEN, DAN BRYANT, and GARY MORGAN spent June 9-10 in the Florida panhandle, collecting matrix samples and vertebrate fossils at Alum Bluff and the La Camelia Mine. DAN BRYANT will be leaving Gainesville on August 12. He will spend August 14-27 in Wyoming doing fieldwork with the American Museum of Natural History (New York). After his return from Wyoming, Dan will be moving to New York City to work at the AMNH and begin a Ph.D. program at Columbia University under the direction of Malcolm McKenna. Dr. McKenna was also Bruce MacFadden's Ph.D. advisor (back in the Stone Ages when the earth was still cooling). DAVE LAMBERT has submitted a manuscript on fossil sea otter evolution, and put the finishing touches on a paper on shovel-tusked gompotheres which has been accepted to the Journal of Paleontology.







FLORIDA PALEONTOLOGICAL SOCIETY, INC.

As stated in the Articles of Incorporation, "The purposes of this Corporation shall be to advance the Science of Paleontology, especially in Florida, to disseminate knowledge of this subject and to facilitate cooperation of all persons concerned with the history, stratigraphy, evolution, ecology, anatomy, and taxonomy of Florida's past fauna and flora. The Corporation shall also be concerned with the collection and preservation of Florida fossils." (Article III, Section 1).

CODE OF ETHICS

ARTICLE IX

- Section 1. Members of the Florida Paleontological Society, Inc., are expected to respect all private and public properties.
- Section 2. No member shall collect without appropriate permission on private or public properties.
- Section 3. Members should make a sincere effort to keep themselves informed of laws, regulations, and rules on collecting on private or public properties.
- Section 4. Members shall not use firearms, blasting equipment, or dredging apparatuses without appropriate licenses and permits.
- Section 5. Members shall dispose of litter properly.
- Section 6. Members shall report to proper state offices any seemingly important paleontological and archaeological sites.
- Section 7. Members shall respect and cooperate with field trip leaders or designated authorities in all collecting areas.
- Section 8. Members shall appreciate and protect our heritage of natural resources.
- Section 9. Members shall conduct themselves in a manner that best represents the Florida Paleontological Society, Inc.

ANNUAL DUES for the FPS are \$5.00 for Associate Membership (persons under age 18) and \$10.00 for Full Membership (persons over age 18) and Institutional Subscriptions. Persons interested in FPS membership need only send their names, addresses, and appropriate dues to the Secretary, Florida Paleontological Society, Inc., at the address inside the front cover. Please make checks payable to the FPS. Members receive a membership card, the FPS newletter, the Papers in Florida Paleontology, and other random publications entitled to members.
